Dear Westover Family,

As I'm working on this newsletter message I am sitting in North Carolina under a sapphire blue sky, listening to the first birds of spring echo in the mountains. And earlier today I saw a young black bear, skinny from a winter's hibernation, walking

through the woods nearby. Spring is all around us.

I am always in awe of spring. No matter what is happening in the world or in our lives, we can always count on spring to bring new life, new color, and a touch of hope.

Two years ago right now, we were all coming to terms with the fact that the pandemic that we thought would last a week or two at most, was going to be with us a while. As we were all struggling with that new reality of masks and distancing and lockdown procedures, the leaves began to peek out on the trees, the birds began to build their nests, and nature went about its business of springtime renewal without missing a beat. Even today as war ravages the countryside in Ukraine, I would wager there are tender green leaves on the plants and the soft chirping birds in the air. Beneath the acrid stench of smoke, the aroma of flowers and freshly growing grass sweetens the air.

Whatever else is happening, Spring is relentless in its march each year.

It is no mistake that we associate the season of spring with the theological idea of hope. In addition to the miracle of Easter, we have the chorus of creation reminding us once again that life always emerges from lifelessness. It's easy to forget in a world that is so torn apart by hardship and sorrow that we are called to live lives of bold hope. In fact, we are called to have hope that is as relentless as spring.

Holding on to that kind of hope is not only something that we do for ourselves. It is also a gift for the world around us. I know that in my life there are people who have knocked on my door and loaned me a cup of hope when I was running a little low. And there are people whose doors where I have poured out a little of my own hope when people needed it. Just as creation emerges in a dance of interconnectedness every year, we live day in and day out in that human web of connection that Dr. King spoke of so eloquently half a century ago.

As we continue our journey into the season after Easter, my prayer for you is that you will find glimpses of hope of Christ in the world. I also pray that you will share those glimpses with the people around you and continue each day to sow more and more seeds of hope in the world.

As for me, my time here in the mountains always refills my cup of hope and peace. May we each find the moments that will fill our cups to overflowing.

• the Building Use Contract submitted by Jefferson Elementary for its graduation ceremony on May 25 and 26.

• moving to Stage 3 of Covid re-opening, effective March 20. Stage 3 includes allowing the choir to sing anthems and the congregation to sing a third hymn, as well as continuing to require masks.

The decision was made to give the extra food to Geyer Springs Methodist Church which serves surrounding low-income neighborhoods with two food pantries a week. Geyer Springs Methodist church graciously houses the El Zócalo program.

Suggested donations, for now, include blankets, hats, underwear, T-shirts, pants, socks (especially for women), and sunscreen.

Incarcerated Program



Our jail programs now include partnerships with the Arkansas Incarcerated Women's Project, Restore Hope, and Pulaski County Sheriff Higgins' Re-entry program, CSI. Kathy Rateliff is teaching creative writing to the women of CSI, and coteaching a class focusing on Ativa Yoga-Meditation (Katherine Shoulders & Janna Knight), and Reading, Writing, Book Club (Kathy's area) for both CSI and Restore Hope men's class. There will be 40-45 students in each class.

There are about 120 students taking the classes. They are motivated, interested, and ready to move forward with their lives. Project Restore Hope prepares them for release and gives them access to treatment for addictions. The program helps them to find jobs, and deal with family issues, housing, and other services that a case worker determines would benefit the student.


We hope to offer regular literacy programs to inmates after staffing issues resolve. It seems that every facility, business, etc. is in need of workers.

The Pulaski County Juvenile Detention Center Art program is ongoing with recent projects including faux stained glass butterflies, and dyeing Easter eggs. Teens work on dyeing their Easter eggs during an April art class. Along with treats from the big bunny, the kids also ate their eggs as PW volunteer Nancy Passini read *The Tale of Peter Rabbit* to them!
