We hear the angels' chorus bearing witness to your coming.


We are waiting. We are watching. We are witnessing.

THE PEACE OF CHRIST

The peace of our Lord Jesus Christ which passes all understanding be with you all. And also with you.

"Gloria in excelsis Deo!" literally translates as "Glory to God in the highest!" This exclamation of the angels refers both to the traditional idea that heaven is a place "up there" where God resides and an acknowledgement that God sits on a throne above all earthly powers.

There is also a bit of subversion in the angels' song. "Gloria" is one of the four virtues of Roman aristocracy in the first century. By proclaiming God's glory "in the highest," the angels place God above even the most powerful in the empire.

In this passage, Matthew continues to set the stage for the birth of Jesus by demonstrating how his birth is in keeping with scripture.

In the first part of the book, Matthew lays out the genealogy of Jesus from creation to Joseph.

Because Matthew's audience was primarily Jewish, it was important for him to show the connection between Jesus and the patriarchs and matriarchs.

Like other material from oral traditions, this 19thcentury African-American spiritual flourished without being written down.

The refrains are the most consistent part of songs like this. The verses may vary from community to community. These verses recall the nativity of Christ.

We Proclaim God's Word

New Testament Reading

Matthew 1:18-25

This is how the birth of Jesus Christ took place.

When Mary his mother was engaged to Joseph, before they were married, she became pregnant by the Holy Spirit. Joseph her husband was a righteous man. Because he didn't want to humiliate her, he decided to call off their engagement quietly.

As he was thinking about this, an angel from the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, don't be afraid to take Mary as your wife, because the child she carries was conceived by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you will call him Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." Now all of this took place so that what the Lord had spoken through the prophet would be fulfilled:

Look! A virgin will become pregnant and give birth to a son, And they will call him, Emmanuel.

(Emmanuel means "God with us.")

When Joseph woke up, he did just as an angel from God commanded and took Mary as his wife. But he didn't have sexual relations with her until she gave birth to a son.

Joseph called him Jesus.

I dare not fear since certainly I know that I am in God's keeping, shielded so, from all that else would harm and in the hour of stern temptation, strengthened by God's power. I tread no path in life to God unknown; I lift no burden, bear no pain alone; my soul a calm, sure hiding place has found: The everlasting Arms my life surround, God, Thou art love! I build my faith on that. I know Thee who has kept my path. And made light for me in the darkness, tempering sorrow so that it reached me like a solemn joy. It were too strange that I should doubt Thy love.

THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

Blessings be to you, Creator God, who in the beginning brought light and life to the world and who continues to bring it love and light everlasting.

In the sacrament, we are reminded of Jesus' ministry and his promises to the disciples on the night before his crucifixion.

Part of remembering Jesus is remembering all the promises that make up the story of his life and ministry. One of those is the story of his mother, Mary, a young woman who had the faith and courage to follow the angel's call and be the Theotokos or god-bearer.

Your song of wisdom echoes through the ages, your ancient promise still brings us hope.

Over the ages you have called people to embrace your hope and share your love. But even when they have closed their ears to the song you did not stop singing. You sent prophets and messengers to your people, reminding them of the promised time of peace and justice that would surround the world.

They came in the midst of our despair and filled us with hope.

And then you came to a young woman named Mary and laid out the promise in a new way

Promising her a son, who would be called Jesus Promising her that in her son the world would be changed

And now as we prepare for that child to be born, we echo the ancient cry:

O come, O come Emmanuel.

Yet even now, as we prepare to celebrate his birth, we remember the life that this baby will live.

We remember how he broke the bonds of human tradition to show all what the Banquet of Hope could be as he ate openly with the despised and the outcast of his world.

And we remember one special meal, foretaste of the banquet that is to come, that he ate with his closest friends.

Gathering them together in an upper room to share the story of liberation, he prepared them for liberation.

And at the end of the meal he took bread, blessed and broke it, then passed it to them saying:

Take and eat. This bread is the body of Life, broken by the world. Eat it in remembrance and in hope.

After that he took the cup, blessed it, and passed it to them saying:

This cup is the sign of the New Covenant. Whenever you drink it, remember me, for I shall not eat or drink again until the time of the heavenly banquet.

Remembering the birth of the child in the stable, we remember also his life, his death and his resurrection.

We remember how he poured his love out on all he met and look forward to his return and the coming reign of peace, love, and justice.

God, you poured your Spirit on Mary and she sang words of defiance and hope. Pour out your Spirit upon us gathered here.

As we eat and drink may we know your presence.

As we eat and drink may we be opened to the possibilities of your hope and power and may we be strengthened in our time of waiting for peace and justice so that we will have the courage to make the Christmas promise a reality.
