

CALL TO CONFESSION

If we say we are completely put together, the truth is not in us.

But if we confess our distractions, our errors, and our anxieties, God will meet us and renew us. Together let us confess our sins against God and one another.

Part of confession is naming our mistakes and shortcomings. Another part is naming those things God hopes for us. In this prayer, the liturgist names what is asked of us in our journey on the Christian path, and in response we acknowledge that we fall short of those expectations.

Confession is not an exercise in guilt. In fact, it is exactly the opposite. We confess not to feel guilty but to make room in our lives and our hearts to feel and know the love and forgiveness of God.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION. (IN UNISON)

God of Mercy and Grace, you come to us in Jesus of Nazareth to break down the dividing walls of hostility between us:

Yet we maintain walls that separate and isolate.

You give us the ministry of reconciliation:

Yet we nurse our wounds and withhold mercy and forgiveness.

You invite us to join with Peter, James, and John on the mountain of Transfiguration:

Yet we deny the wonders you have worked in our own lives.

You ask us to acknowledge and share our wealth:

Yet we refuse to recognize and relieve the poverty around us.

You bless our lives with boundless love:

Yet we fail to witness to that love, and so keep others from knowing you.

Forgive our selfishness, we pray.

Transform us by your Spirit and your Word into that which pleases you, the image of Christ. Amen.

Mindful of personal preferences and safety, please offer signs of peace to those around you.

The Transfiguration of Jesus appears in all three synoptic gospels (Matthew, Mark, and Luke) as well as the Second Epistle of Peter.

In Greek the word for transfiguration is metamorphosis.

It is unusual but not unheard of for hymns to be unrhymed as this one is. The author wrote the text to be a meditative prayer rooted in many scriptures with the theme and motif of light.

While he was still speaking, look, a bright cloud overshadowed them. A voice from the cloud said, "This is my Son whom I dearly love. I am very pleased with him. Listen to him!" Hearing this, the disciples fell on their faces, filled with awe.

But Jesus came and touched them. "Get up," he said. "Don't be afraid." When they looked up, they saw no one except Jesus.



Lojeski, who died in 2020, began his career as part of the Doodletown Pipers, an easy listening vocal group in the 1960's and 70's.
