



+Sung Response "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing" NETTLETON



American folk singer and activist Pete Seeger became a fixture on American radio in the 1940's. Born into a musical family, his father was Harvard-trained composer Charles Louis Seeger, Jr. and his mother, Constance De Clyver Seeger (nee Edson), a concert violinist, was trained at the Paris Conservatory and Julliard.

Seeger is best remembered as an activist for the labor movement and other progressive causes. Supportive of fighting to defeat Hitler, he opposed the draft as it disadvantaged the poor who would do most of the fighting. In the end, the bombing of Pearl Harbor and the emerging facts of Nazi atrocities changed Seeger's mind.

Seeger was awarded multiple Grammys, a Peabody, the National Medal of Arts and was a Kennedy Center Honoree in 1994.

The Bells of Rhymney consists of Seeger's music and lyrics drawn from words written by Welsh poet Idris Davies. The lyrics are drawn from Davies' poem Gwalia Deserta, first published in 1938.

The poem was written in response to a local coal mining accident and the failure of the 1926 General Strike. The stanzas of the poem follow the pattern of the nursery rhyme "Oranges and Lemons" and recount the church bells throughout South Wales witnessing to the suffering of the miners and the injustice of the coal barons toward the working classes.

Although Seeger's 1958 recording is the earliest iteration of the song, a more famous recording was produced by the Byrds in 1965.

NEW TESTAMENT READING

Luke 19:29-40

As Jesus came to Bethphage and Bethany on the Mount of Olives, he gave two disciples a task. He said, "Go into the village over there. When you enter it, you will find tied up there a colt that no one has ever ridden. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone asks, 'Why are you untying it?' just say, 'Its master needs it.'" +Affirmation of Faith

Moses, Nehemiah, Jesus, and many other leaders in the stories of scripture brought hope with their courage to speak against injustice by calling out those responsible, and saying:
